Capacity building is not just about the capacity of a nonprofit today – it’s about the future. This makes it difficult to measure the impact of capacity building activities – especially in the short term. One fact we have learned for certain, is that if you offer opportunities for local nonprofits and charities to participate in capacity building activities ... they will come!

Board leadership and financial management were two key skill areas Edmonton area nonprofits and charities chose to develop. Another key area of capacity building support was in the Ethno Cultural community. By bringing Ethno Cultural leaders together with City administration leaders increased their understanding of how to approach and interact with city decision makers.

ECVO supported individuals from the Edmonton nonprofit sector to come together in 2013 for purposes of mutual benefit. The types of networks and partnerships they engaged in were quite diverse, offering opportunities for Executive Directors, emerging leaders, program staff and those dedicated to professional development.

ECVO even ventured into the world of speed dating in 2013. While we don’t believe any participants found a life partner, we received extremely positive responses from the mentors who increased their professional networks and the mentees who benefited from the knowledge gained during speed meetings with different mentors.



ECVO ADVOCATES FOR EDMONTON'S NONPROFIT SECTOR

Challenging GOA

When the GOA canceled its Summer Temporary Employment Program in 2013, the nonprofit sector responded with disbelief and anger. ECVO listened then took action by writing to, and meeting with Minister Hancock to discuss options for the future. The door remains open to hope for a new program in 2015.

Canadian Federation of Voluntary Sector Networks

ECVO participates in this national network which most recently welcomed Volunteer Canada and Imagine Canada to its membership. Being associated with these umbrella organizations allows ECVO to bring home a national perspective on issues and to profile Edmonton's great accomplishments.

Alberta Nonprofit Summit

ECVO was at the table when 35 key stakeholder groups met in September 2013 to share views about strengthening Alberta's nonprofit sector. Strong leadership, systems change, advocacy, telling our story and communication were the major themes ECVO brought back to its membership.


